

# ASSERTIVE COMMUNITY TREATMENT (ACT)

# WHAT IS ACT?

ACT is an intensive treatment designed to help address youth mental health and improve overall functioning in the community. A provider team, which includes a psychiatric provider, therapist, nurse, and care coordinator, offers support 24-hours a day, seven days a week. The team works to reduce barriers to success and strengthen support systems.

# WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

Children and youth up to age 21 with MaineCare (or those under age 19 with MaineCare's Katie Beckett waiver option) with a mental health diagnosis and a need for intensive treatment to help with challenging behaviors that increase risk of residential or in-patient treatment.

This service requires that youth and their caregivers participate in treatment.

ACT hours are determined by clinical need.

# **HOW DOES ACT HELP?**

ACT is based on the unique needs of youth and their families. Treatment is focused on strengths. The ACT team can:

- Connect youth and families to peer support services
- Complete a psychiatric evaluation
- Provide medication management
- Provide individual, family and/or group therapy
- Provide intensive care coordination for youth and families
- Offer and connect youth and families to substance use treatment services
- Help families develop coping skills
- Help youth build skills to regulate their feelings thoughts and behaviors
- Provide crisis stabilization services
- Help families respond to mental health crisis more effectively
- Teach youth coping skills to manage crisis
- Assist youth with vocational support services.
- Prevent or reduce psychiatric hospitalization and/or residential treatment
- Prevent or reduce involvement within the juvenile justice system
